3-4 December 2008

This document incorporates all comments received from Delegations and Observers. It is circulated for information with a view to its adoption at the 68th Plenary Meeting in 2009.

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SUMMARY RECORD OF THE 67TH PLENARY MEETING OF THE OECD FRUIT AND VEGETABLES SCHEME

1. Opening remarks by the Secretariat

Mr. Michael Ryan, Head of the OECD Codes and Schemes Unit, welcomed the delegates and opened the meeting.

2. Election of Officers

At the 67th session of the Plenary Meeting, Mr. P. Schauenberg (Switzerland) was confirmed as Chairperson, Mr. R. Ben-David (Israel) and Mrs. Viera Baricicova (Slovak Republic) were confirmed as Vice-Chairs (in their capacity as Chair-Elect and Out-Going Chair respectively).

3. Adoption of the agenda [TAD/CA/FVS/A(2008)1]

The draft Agenda was adopted. Delegates noted the changes in the codes of some documents.

4. Approval of the Draft Summary Record of the 66th Session of the Plenary Meeting [TAD/CA/FVS/M(2007)1]

The Plenary Meeting approved the Summary Record of the 66th session.

5. Report on the 2008 International Training Course sponsored by the OECD in Slovakia [TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)8]

Mrs. Baricicova presented the report of the 2008 International Training Course (ITC). She informed Delegates that the next ITC will take place in Mojmirovce, Slovakia on **28 June -1 July 2008**. The Agenda is still open and she would welcome ideas and comments on what products should be discussed and interpreted during the course.

6. Participating countries, other interested countries [TAD/CA/FVS(2008)1]

The OECD Secretariat informed Delegates that there were no changes in the number of participating countries over the last year. However, two applications were in the pipeline for 2008. In accordance with the OECD procedure, evaluation missions took place to Serbia and Kenya following their official request to join the OECD Fruit and Vegetables Scheme. The evaluation reports were prepared and are on the Agenda for discussion and approval.

The delegate from Slovenia gave a short oral presentation of the fruit and vegetables quality inspection system in Slovenia. She mentioned that inspectors widely use the OECD explanatory materials. The Secretariat informed the Delegates that Slovenia is one of the five accession countries which access to the OECD.

The delegate from the UK thanked the Secretariat for the invitation to participate on the Plenary Meeting. He informed the meeting that the UK is always ready to contribute to the work on brochures for future harmonisation and greater transparency in the application of international standards.

7. Secretariat's Activity and Budget Report [TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)1], Stocktaking of the reform [TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)2]

The OECD Secretariat informed Delegates of the activities since the 66th Plenary Meeting and of the budget and the programme of work of the Scheme for 2009/10.

Delegates agreed that there is no need to prepare the document on the stocktaking of the reform, as all elements of the reform plan have been implemented or being implemented and built into the actual programme of work of the Scheme.

8. In-depth Evaluation of the OECD Agricultural Codes and Schemes for International Trade [C(2008)95, C(2008)95/CORR1]

The OECD Secretariat informed Delegates that the Council of the OECD carried out an in-depth evaluation on the Trade and Agriculture Directorate, including the Agricultural Codes and Schemes for International trade. The result of the evaluation was very positive (Relevance: high; Efficiency: high; Effectiveness: high) for the four programme including the Fruit and Vegetables Scheme.

The Plenary Meeting discussed the follow-up on the recommendation by the in-depth evaluation. It was decided that the OECD Secretariat should explore and clarify possible areas for cooperation between the four programmes. A conference call will be set up for the Bureau of the four programmes in January 2009 in order to develop an action plan for cooperation.

9. Evaluation of Serbia's request for accession to the Fruit and Vegetables Scheme [TAD/CA/FVS(2008)2]

The Secretariat informed the Plenary Meeting that Mrs. V. Baricicova (Slovakia) and Mr. Cs. Gaspar (OECD) carried out the evaluation mission to Serbia. The Chair invited the Serbian delegation to present the key elements of the Serbian fruit and vegetables sector and inspection system to the Plenary Meeting.

Mrs. Milosevic and Mrs. Hrehorovic made a presentation on the fruit and vegetables sector and quality inspection system in Serbia. Serbia applies 69 national standards for fresh fruit and vegetables. The quality inspection is implemented within the framework of the food inspection. The quality checks are compulsory at import stage and at all marketing stages in the internal market. Export inspection is implemented only on request in Serbia.

The evaluation team reported that they had carried out the examination of the Serbian fruit and vegetables quality inspection system. It was mentioned that the quality checks are implemented at accredited laboratories and not on the spot of inspection. It was noted that Serbia should develop an export quality inspection system within a 3 years period, based on the Scheme's rules. It is a requirement for Members of the OECD Fruit and Vegetables Scheme.

Following some further clarifications and discussions among the delegations, delegates were invited to decide on Serbia's request to join the Fruit and Vegetables Scheme.

Delegates at the Plenary Meeting unanimously agreed to Serbia's request for accession to the OECD Fruit and Vegetables Scheme. It was also decided that it is not necessary to organise an evaluation mission to Serbia in the third year of Serbia's Membership in the Scheme. However, Serbia should present a regular progress report to the Plenary Meeting on the development of the export quality inspection system for 3 years.

The Secretariat will revise the draft report according to the decision of the Plenary Meeting. The new document code will be: TAD/CA/FVS(2008)2/REV1.

Mrs. Milosevic thanked all the delegates at the meeting for agreeing to admit Serbia to the OECD Fruit and Vegetables Scheme and thanked both Mrs. Baricicova and Mr. Gaspar for carrying out the evaluation.

10. Evaluation of Kenya's request for accession to the Fruit and Vegetables Scheme [TAD/CA/FVS(2008)3]

The Secretariat informed the Plenary Meeting that Mrs. H. Wessels (South Africa) and Mr. I. Ecsedi (Hungary) carried out the evaluation mission to Kenya. The Chair invited Kenya's delegation to present the key elements of the Kenyan fruit and vegetables sector and inspection system to the Plenary Meeting.

Mrs. Ntoyai made a presentation on the fruit and vegetables sector and quality inspection system in Kenya. Kenya applies the EU standards for fresh fruit and vegetables at the export stage. The Kenya Plant Health Inspectorate Service (KEPHIS) is the responsible authority for implementing fruit and vegetables inspection at the export stage. Kenya also applies the EU inspection rules which are based on the OECD system.

The evaluation team reported that they had carried out the examination of Kenya's fruit and vegetables quality inspection system. It was noted that Kenya should harmonise the export inspection system with the OECD rules within a 3 years period. The evaluation team further suggested that Kenya should improve its inspection tools and reference documents, registration of producers and traders and education system for inspectors and stakeholders.

Following some further clarifications and discussions among the delegations, delegates were invited to decide on Kenya's request to join the Fruit and Vegetables Scheme.

Delegates at the Plenary Meeting unanimously agreed to Kenya's request for accession to the OECD Fruit and Vegetables Scheme. It was also decided that it is not necessary to organise an evaluation mission to Kenya in the third year of Kenya's Membership in the Scheme. However, Kenya should present a regular progress report to the Plenary Meeting on the development in the harmonisation of the export quality inspection system for 3 years. It was also decided that the evaluation team's suggestions on the introduction of quality standards on the domestic market and on the improvement of traceability is outside the scope of the Scheme and, therefore, should be deleted from the report.

The Secretariat will revise the report according to the decision of the Plenary Meeting. The new document code will be TAD/CA/FVS(2008)3/REV1.

Mrs. Ntoyai thanked all the delegates at the meeting for agreeing to admit Kenya to the OECD Fruit and Vegetables Scheme and thanked both Mrs. Wessels and Mr. Ecsedi for carrying out the evaluation.

11. Peer Review

a) Publication of the Hungarian Peer Review [TAD/CA/FVS(2007)2/REV1]

The OECD Secretariat informed the Plenary Meeting, that Hungary agreed on the declassification of the Peer Review report on the Hungarian fruit and vegetables system, in order to help OECD Member Countries and new accession countries in the development and preparation of their fruit and vegetables quality inspection system. Following this agreement, the OECD published the "Peer Review of Fruit and Vegetables Quality Inspection System in Hungary, 2008" in both English and French. The booklet was handed out to Delegates at the Plenary Meeting.

b) Draft Peer Review of Slovakia [TAD/CA/FVS(2008)4]

The Plenary Meeting was informed that Mrs. Papadimitriou (Greece), Mr. Nemeth (Hungary) and Mr. Gaspar (OECD Secretariat) were the members of the Evaluation Team that undertook the Slovak Peer Review.

Slovakia gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Slovak fruit and vegetables sector and quality inspection system.

Mr. Nemeth informed Delegates on the outcome of the Slovak Peer Review, in a letter addressed to the Plenary Meeting. He mentioned that the Team could see an experienced and well working Coordinating Authority in Slovakia. This Authority is able to manage all aspects of fruit and vegetables quality regulation and inspection. However, the Coordinating Authority should have more influence on the professional activities of inspectors. This is a general thought which can be taken into consideration on any further Peer Reviews, as fruit and vegetables inspection services are mostly not independent organisations. A good coordination can only be ensured, if a Coordinating Authority has enough power to enforce its professional tasks. It should be able to ensure an equal inspection pressure in all stages in the marketing chain, to process data coming from inspection and to give feedback to standardisation based on inspection experience, including professional and social aspects.

It was also mentioned that Peer Reviews can be useful not only for the examined countries, but also for other countries and professional organisations, like OECD. It is of great interest to know more about the inspection practices. The OECD Scheme recognised this and Peer Reviews are now a standard project in the Programme of Work.

Delegates are invited to send written comments on the draft report of the Slovak Peer review to the Secretariat by 20 January 2009.

Slovakia was asked if they agree to the declassification of the Peer Review Report. Slovakia will inform the Secretariat once the decision has been made in the Ministry of Agriculture.

c) Proposal by the Secretariat to amend the Procedure and Questionnaire for the Implementation of Peer Reviews [TAD/CA/FVS(2008)5]

The OECD Secretariat introduced a proposal to amend the procedure and questionnaire for the implementation of peer reviews. The proposal was based on the experiences of the two peer reviews carried out by the Scheme, as well as the decisions made at the 66th Plenary Meeting on this issue.

The OECD Secretariat proposed that the cost of the participation in the Evaluation Team should be covered by the regular Scheme's budget. This proposal was based on the experience that it can be difficult for experts of the evaluation team to find and justify a budget from their Ministry or Organisation. This can be a bottleneck to the organisation of peer reviews in the future. Also it was noted that in order to ensure objectivity and independence, it is important to have separate funding of experts. Some countries felt that the peer review is useful only for the examined country and the countries which participate in the evaluation process. Therefore the cost of the peer reviews should be covered by the countries. In contrary, many countries accepted the Secretariat's explanation and agreed that the peer review activity is an important and useful element of the programme of the Scheme for all Member Countries. They would accept the Secretariat proposal on the funding. However, in this context, the funding of the Secretariat to participate on Meeting of the Heads of National Inspection Services should also be done in a similar basis.

Delegations agreed on all amendments which were based on the outcome of the discussion at the 66th Plenary Meeting. At the Chair's request, the proposal on funding will be reviewed and will be discussed again at the 68th Plenary Meeting in 2009.

12. Draft proposal to amend the OECD provision on sampling [TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)3]

Mrs. Bickelmann informed the Plenary Meeting that she received comments on the draft proposal on the sampling procedure from France and Romania. A working group should be established on this issue to elaborate a more detailed proposal for the next Plenary Meeting. It would be also pragmatic if this work would be combined with the work on the OECD guidelines on inspection.

It was noted that the revised sampling method should be simple and should ensure representative result at the same time.

A Working Group on Sampling was established. The members are: Germany (rapporteur), France, Romania, South Africa and New Zealand.

13. Draft Explanatory Materials

The OECD Secretariat informed the Meeting that the PowerPoint presentations on the 14 existing explanatory brochures have been prepared and uploaded on USB keys together with all illustrations of the brochures stamped with OECD logo and all of the OECD Scheme's rules and guidelines. The USB keys were handed out to Delegates at the Plenary Meeting.

The delegate from Turkey mentioned that they prepared the Turkish version of the OECD explanatory brochures. They are ready to be published on the official Scheme's website.

The priority list on brochures for 2009-2010 has not been established, taking into account the ongoing work on many brochures and the exploratory work on the possible transfer of activities of the Scheme to UNECE. The list will be established in 2009 at the Plenary Meeting.

Mrs. Baricicova, the Head of the Steering Committee informed the Plenary Meeting on the ongoing work on brochures:

b) Draft brochure on apples

It was reported that most illustrations of the brochure have been adopted by the Working Group, except 10 photos, which will be prepared in the coming season. The text of the OECD/UNECE standard on apples has to be amended by the UNECE in May 2009, at the next session of the UNECE Specialised Section of Fresh Fruit and Vegetables. An OECD Working Group on Apples is also planned to be held on the margin of this meeting. **The final adoption of the explanatory brochure on apples is foreseen at the 68th Plenary Meeting in December 2009.**

c) Draft brochure on citrus fruits

The Working Group on Citrus Fruits, led by Israel, has finalised the explanatory brochure on citrus fruits. However some illustrations need to be revised by Israel. These photos will be uploaded to the EDG with the view to the adoption by written procedure by 15 January 2009. Producing countries should also send additional photos on varieties and defects to Israel and the Secretariat by this date. The hard copy and the electronic copy of the new brochure concept were introduced as a mode for future use. The text of the brochure is also ready and follows the requirements of the existing OECD/UNECE standard on citrus fruits. However, the discussion on the text of the explanatory brochure may be reopened as the standard will be revised by the UNECE in May 2009. Therefore an OECD Working Group on Citrus Fruits is planned to be held on the margin of the next session of the UNECE Specialised Section of Fresh Fruit and Vegetables.

The delegate from Spain expressed the concern of the Spanish citrus industry on the range concept. They are concerned, that showing six to eight photographs on one parameter may create the same number of virtual quality classes. This would not correspond to the standard. Therefore, it is necessary to mark clearly the internationally accepted borders of the three quality classes in the brochure.

The final adoption of the explanatory brochure on citrus fruits is planned for the 68th Plenary Meeting in December 2009.

d) Draft brochure on potatoes

The working group has finalised the explanatory brochures on early and ware potatoes. Six photos are still missing, mostly on labelling, frost and freeze damage and presentations. These six photos will be uploaded to the EDG with the view to adoption, by the written procedure by 28 February 2009. The Plenary Meeting adopted the explanatory brochure on potatoes on the condition that the abovementioned criteria will be fulfilled. **The publication of the brochure is foreseen for April 2009.**

e) Draft brochure on melons

Delegations were informed that the CTIFL (France) has not made much progress on the explanatory brochure on melons in 2008. This work is not a priority for them at the moment, due to the changing EU legislation on the fruit and vegetables sector. France informed the Meeting that they will examine the possibility to finalise this brochure and will report the result to the 68th Plenary Meeting in December 2009.

f) Draft brochure on hazelnuts

Turkey presented the amendments made on the brochure since the last working group meeting held in November 2008. Some photos still need to be revised or reorganised. Turkey will also make minor amendments on the text. France will provide photos on "mucron" variety. The photos and the text will be uploaded to EDG with the view of adoption by written procedure by the beginning of January 2009. The Plenary Meeting adopted the explanatory brochure on inshell hazelnuts in the condition that the before mentioned criteria will be fulfilled. **The publication of the electronic version of the inshell hazelnuts is foreseen in the first half of 2009.** The hard copy version will be published together with the brochure on hazelnuts kernel, when it will be finalised.

g) Draft brochure on apricots

The photos of the brochure on apricots were first time presented at the working group meeting held in 2 December 2009. The PowerPoint presentation will be uploaded to EDG by the end of 2008. A working group meeting is planned before the apricot season starts in 2009; in May in Geneva on the margin of the next session of the UNECE Specialised Section of Fresh Fruit and Vegetables. **The adoption of the brochure on apricots is planned for the 68th Plenary Meeting in December 2009.**

h) Draft brochure on pears

The Working Group has finalised the explanatory brochure on pears. Only two photos are missing, which will be uploaded to EDG with the view of adoption by written procedure by 28 February 2009. Minor amendments in the standard should also be made at the next session of the UNECE Specialised Section of Fresh Fruit and Vegetables in May 2009. The Plenary Meeting adopted the explanatory brochure on pears on the condition that the abovementioned criteria will be fulfilled. **The publication of the brochure is foreseen for July 2009.**

i) Draft brochure on peaches and nectarines

The photos of the brochure were presented at the Working Group Meeting in November 2008. The revised PowerPoint presentation will be uploaded to EDG at the beginning of 2009. Spain needs another season to complete the set of photographs for the brochure. An OECD Working Group on Peaches and Nectarines is planned to be held on the margin of the next session of the UNECE Specialised Section of Fresh Fruit and Vegetables in May 2009. **The adoption of the brochure on peaches and nectarines is planned for the 68th Plenary Meeting in December 2009.**

14. Guidelines

a) Guidelines on inspector's training

The Working Group informed the Plenary Meeting that there were no major developments in the work on the guidelines. They will prepare a proposal for the Plenary Meeting in 2009.

b) Guidelines on quality inspection

The Plenary Meeting decided that the work on the guidelines on quality inspection will be connected to the work on the revision of the OECD sampling plan. (see more details under item 12 of this report). The draft guidelines will be ready for discussion at the Plenary Meeting in 2009.

c) Guidelines on the organisation of the Meeting of Heads of National Inspection Services [TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)6]

The OECD Secretariat informed the Plenary Meeting, that following the request of Member Countries, the draft guidelines on the organisation of the Meeting of Heads of National Inspection Services were developed. This document could be the basis of a 2 pages pamphlet, which would be available on the Scheme's website.

Delegates discussed the draft guidelines. It was noted that the section on funding should be revised and the cost of participation by the OECD Secretariat, similar to the peer review visits, should be covered by the regular Scheme's budget. The Plenary Meeting adopted the guidelines on the organisation of the Meeting of Heads of National Inspection Services with this change in the text.

The OECD Secretariat will revise the document according to the decision made by the Plenary Meeting. The new document's code will be: TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)6/REV1. The electronic version of the guidelines will be also prepared and will be available on the Scheme's website.

15. Presentation on distance learning tools [TAD/CA/FVS/RD(2008)7]

The development of distance learning tools is a part of the Scheme's Reform Plan. The OECD Secretariat contacted the FAO Secretariat in order to invite them to share their experience on this issue with the Scheme Member Countries. Mrs. Cristina Petracchi made a presentation on e-learning in support of capacity building. The presentation was well received by Delegates. The OECD Secretariat was asked to examine the possibility to develop a common project on distance learning with the FAO. A proposal will be prepared for the 2009 Plenary Meeting of the Scheme.

16. Economic evaluation of the market situation for citrus fruits

Mrs. Leyre Abasolo, Representative of CLAM gave a presentation on the market situation and trade in citrus fruits in the Mediterranean countries. The presentation gave an overview of the four main product categories (oranges, easy-peelers, lemons and grapefruits) and forecast of trade for the 2008-2009 season. The presentation was well received by Delegates.

17. Report of the Exploratory Task Force

Mrs. Quaedylied, the Chair of the OECD Exploratory Task Force Team informed Delegates on the latest development in the different aspects of the exploratory work. It was mentioned that the UNECE amended the Terms of Reference of the WP7 in 2008. However, the UNECE Secretariat has to continue informing national delegations about the new Terms of Reference that allow all UN Member States to participate on an equal basis. It was also mentioned that during 2008, the OECD and UNECE Task Forces did not finalise their recommendations on the reorganisation of the UNECE meeting structure, so no major changes were made in that area. It was reported the UNECE can fund the work on two explanatory brochures per year. The format of these brochures would follow the UNECE's document standard and would be printed in the UNECE print-shop. The UNECE is currently working on the brochure on sweet peppers. The result of the work will provide input into the evaluation report of the OECD Exploratory Task Force Team. This report should be ready at least one month before the date of Plenary Meeting in 2009.

The detailed written report on the development of the work of the Exploratory Task Force in 2008 will be uploaded to the EDG to keep delegations informed.

18. Statements by International Organisations on recent developments

a) European Commission

Mrs. Sandrine Valentin, the representative of the European Commission made a presentation on reform of the Common Market Organisation in the fruit and vegetables sector. According to the draft regulation, the number of specific marketing standards will be reduced from 36 to 10. The EU will introduce a general standard for those products which will be not covered by specific standards. The publication of the regulation is foreseen in the end of 2008. It will be applied from 1 July 2009. The presentation will be uploaded to EDG in order to keep Delegations informed.

b) Codex Alimentarius

The representative of the secretariat of the Joint FAO/WHO Food Standards Programme (Codex Alimentarius Commission) highlighted the main results of the 14th Session of the Codex Committee of Fresh Fruits and Vegetables (Mexico City, 12-17 May 2008) and the 31st Session of the Codex Alimentarius Commission (Geneva, 30 June – 4 July 2008). The Commission adopted the Codex Standard for Tomatoes and provisionally adopted the Draft Standard for Apples, while the adoption of the Standard for Bitter Cassava was suspended and its labelling section was returned to the CCFFV for further consideration. It approved new work proposals from the CCFFV on avocados, fresh chilli peppers and tree tomatoes (tamarillo), while proposal on durians was referred back to the CCFFV in order to review the need for a worldwide standard.

c) UNECE

Mrs. Cram-Martos, the representative of the UNECE informed Delegates that the UNECE Working Party 7 (WP7) adopted: (a) revised standard layouts for fresh fruit and vegetables and for dry and dried

produce as new standard layouts; (b) new/revised standards for seed potatoes, early and ware potatoes, apples, pears, lettuce, avocados, tomatoes, cucumbers, dried peaches, edible meat co-products and duck meat; (c) revised texts on apricots, peaches and nectarines, pistachio kernels and peeled pistachio kernels, blanched almond kernels, hazelnut kernels and the 2002 version of the Standard on Inshell Walnuts as recommendations on trial through 2009; (d) new texts on inshell macadamia nuts and macadamia kernels as recommendations on trial through 2010. The Working Party approved the colour gauge for walnut.

It was expected that the Standard for Sweet Peppers the UNECE brochure for sweet peppers would be finalized by the Working Group (France, Germany, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the United States) for consideration at the 2009 session of the Specialized Section.

She also reported on three International workshops that UNECE would be organizing in 2009:

- i. On the standards for seed potatoes as well as early and ware potatoes for countries of Africa and the Middle East, Cairo, 16-19 March 2009.
- ii. International workshop on commercial quality standards for fresh fruit and vegetables for countries of Eastern and South-Eastern Africa, Kenya, in April 2009.
- iii. Regional workshop on standards for fresh fruit and dry and dried produce for Central Asia, Kyrgyzstan, first half of July

To celebrate the United Nations Year of the Potato the UNECE had also developed a international cook book of potato recipes, which was being distributed to members of its Specialized Sections, but could also be purchased from the UN.

d) CLAM

Mrs. Leyre Abasolo, Representative of CLAM informed the Plenary Meeting that they publish an evaluation and statistics of the export of citrus fruits in the Mediterranean Basin. She will submit this publication to the Secretariat in order to keep inform the Member Countries of the Scheme. She also mentioned that the CLAM is in favour with the Scheme's work on the OECD explanatory brochure on citrus fruits. She participated on the Working Group Meeting on Citrus Fruits and suggest that varieties shown in the brochure should be the most traded ones. It would be also important to show the most important damages and diseases which could affect the fruits.

e) COLEACP

Mrs. Catherine Guichard, the representative of COLEACP held a presentation on its activities. COLEACP is a non-profit inter-professional association, representing and defending the collective interests of ACP producers/exporters and EU importers of fruits, vegetables, flowers and plants. The COLEACP, in collaboration with CIRAD recently published an information letter on the fighting against the fruit and vegetables flies which is available on their website: www.coleacp.org.

19. Nomination of officers for 2009

Mrs. Viera Baricicova (Slovakia) stepped down from the Bureau. Delegates agreed to nominate Mr. Istvan Ecsedi (Hungary) as incoming Vice-Chair. Delegates thanked Mr. Pierre Schauenberg (Switzerland) for his excellent chairing of the Plenary Meeting and the development of the Programme of Work. Mr. Schauenberg will remain vice-chair of the Plenary Meeting for a further 2 year period. In 2009, Mr Ran Ben David (Israel) will take over as Chair.

20. Next Meeting - 2009

The 68th Plenary Meeting will be held in Paris, on **8-11 December 2009**. It was agreed, that there will be 1.5 days Working Group Meetings followed by 2 days Plenary Meeting.

21. Next Meeting of the Heads of National Inspection Services

The delegate from Finland informed the Plenary Meeting, that the Next Meeting of the Heads of National Inspection Services will be held on **2-4 June 2009, Helsinki, Finland**.

22. Other Business

Layout of the OECD explanatory brochures

Germany proposed to amend the layout of the OECD explanatory brochures. Mrs. Bickelmann collected all amendments in the text done by the OECD Working Group on Citrus Fruits on 30 May 2008. It was also proposed that the comparative summary table should be deleted from the layout. In case of long and complex standards, these tables are too complicated and in simple standards they are not really necessary. The Plenary Meeting agreed that the proposal will be uploaded to EDG with the view of adoption by written procedure. In this case, the brochures planned to be published in 2009 could follow the new layout.

Capacity building activities, Workshops

Kenya informed the Plenary Meeting that a UNECE workshop on fruit and vegetables is planned to take place in Kenya **during the first half of 2009**, with the participation of 12 African Countries.

The OECD Secretariat informed Delegates that there will be an **OECD Workshop on Fruit and Vegetables on April 2009, in Albania**, thanks to a voluntary contribution to the OECD from the Slovak Republic.
