What does becoming a Correspondent mean?

As a Correspondent you would become a formal part of the Project's growing "network of networks". This network will ensure that the rest of this large and growing global movement can learn from initiatives such as yours, and will assist others in your country to learn about the Global Project too.

What does it involve?

Becoming a Correspondent is not onerous. It would entail the following actions/commitments:

- we will profile your initiative on our website www.oecd.org/progress and list you as a correspondent; in exchange, you will put on your web site a link to the Global Project's one and to the Istanbul Declaration;
- we will advocate on our Newsletter the events you organise and your activities; in exchange, you will disseminate the Global Project's Newsletter to your network;
- we will inform you about forthcoming initiatives and projects, asking you for comments and/or suggestions on their focus and organisation; you will have the opportunity to propose to the Global Project to undertake actions useful for your activity.
