I Objectives

The international conference “ Beyond the gap between the West and the Islamic world: a French-American dialogue”, is co-organized by the French-American Foundation – France, The Middle-East-Mediterranean Chair program of Sciences Po Paris, and Foreign Policy France.

The conference will explore the grounds for developing positive relations between the West and the Islamic world, to replace hostility and resentment with a dialogue based on trust and understanding.

In that enterprise, France and the United States have a common interest in working together. Both countries are old allies, with U.S.-French diplomatic relations stretching back more than 225 years. Both countries have shared values, and are actively committed to addressing common problems, regionally and globally.

The conference will bring together key leaders in the fields of politics, business, media, academia, and civil society from the Islamic world and the West to discuss the most effective ways for interaction and collaboration.

It will also assess the opportunities and challenges facing political leaders in charting a new direction in the relationship between the West and the Islamic world, at a critical time in the US political agenda, in the aftermath of an unprecedented international financial crisis.

In mapping the different kinds of dialogue, this conference will emphasize the diversity between and within the terms “Islam” and the “West”: both worlds are not self-contained entities; they on the contrary interact and overlap in multiple ways. We will throughout the conference agenda remain fully aware of the complex and multifaceted reality that the West and the Islamic world represent.

The efforts led by our organizations to contribute meaningfully toward the promotion of the dialogue between the West and the Islamic world will be pursued and deepened over the next years.

The Middle-East-Mediterranean Chair of Sciences Po Paris

In 1985, Prof. Rémy Leveau opened the doctoral Program on the Modern Arab World, joined by **Prof. Ghassan Salamé** and **Prof. Gilles Kepel**. The program, now chaired by Gilles Kepel, played a pivotal role in training the young generation of Middle east scholars in Europe: dozen of PhD candidates graduated, publishing many dissertations in different languages. **In 2003**, Sciences Po launched the **Middle East & Mediterranean Chair Program**. An endowed program funded by major corporations, it aims at bridging the gap between the private and public sectors and academia. It allows PhD students to develop ambitious fieldwork research, and provides administrations and corporation with first hand knowledge of the Modern Middle East & Mediterranean from a social Sciences viewpoint. **Eurogolfe was created by Sciences Po**, supported by the French ministry of Foreign Affairs. A hub between social sciences scholars from the GCC and Europe, with branches in the UAE and Kuwait, this program organizes a yearly forum where academics meet with private and public sector leaders. The fourth edition have taken place in Venice in October 2008, the next one will be organize in Kuwait. **In 2005**, Sciences Po launched its Middle east and Mediterranean undergraduate campus in Menton, with courses in Arabic, English and French. **In 2007 The Kuwait Program** at sciences Po is established, a cooperative agreement between the Kuwait Foundation for the Advancement of Sciences (KFAS) and Sciences Po whose purpose is to enhance research, teaching and to provide decision makers with analysis capacity to deal with the impact of globalization on Kuwait and the Gulf Region, to foster networks between researchers and senior officials from the Gulf region with their counterparts, and to contribute to the development of the Menton Education program. **In 2008**, the Kuwait Eurogolfe professorship appointed **Prof Steffen Hertog**. The Professorship is hosted by the Middle East and Mediterranean Chair Program and is focused on topics of relevance to Kuwait and the Gulf in their relationship to Europe.

Three eminent and internationally renowned experts are participating in the project:

Dr. Gilles Kepel : Dr. Kepel is a prominent French scholar and analyst of the Islamic and the Arab world. He holds degrees in Arabic, English and philosophy, a Ph.D. in sociology and a Ph.D. in political science. He has previous international teaching experiences that include a visiting professorship at New York University (1994) and a visiting professorship at Columbia University (1995-1996). He is the Chairman of the Middle East & Mediterranean Studies, of the doctoral program on the Muslim World at Sciences Po Paris and of Eurogolfe Program.

Dr. Bassma Kodmani: A dual French and Syrian national, Bassma Kodmani is the Executive Director of the Arab Reform Initiative. She is also senior adviser on international cooperation to the French national research council (CNRS). From 1999 to 2005 she headed the Governance and International Cooperation Program at the Ford Foundation office for the Middle East and North Africa. She had special responsibility for initiating and supporting joint Israeli-Palestinian projects, including track II meetings. Previously, she established and directed the Middle East Program at the Institut Français des Relations Internationales (IFRI) in Paris and was Associate Professor of International Relations at Paris University.

Dr. Antonella Caruso, Chercheur associée, Institut Montaigne. Antonella Caruso graduated in Arabic Language and Islamic Sciences at the University la Sapienza in Rome. She worked as special Adviser on Middle Eastern affairs to the Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs (1989-1992) and as senior adviser to the CEO of the Italian energy company ENI before leaving Italy in 1999. Author of several

academic publications, she has been associate researcher at the French think-tank Institut Montaigne, where she completed her research on the institutionalization processes of Islam in Europe (In the Name of Islam, Note, September 2007) and she is the North Africa and the Middle East editor of the Italian geopolitical magazine Limes (L'espresso group). She is heading a non-governmental project on national reconciliation in Iraq in partnership with the American NGOs IISD and USIP.
