Annual Transport Statistics

Purpose

To provide an annual publication presenting main statistical data in the transport sector.

Objectives and outputs

Data are collected in a harmonised way to facilitate comparisons between modes of transport and between countries by means of a questionnaire common to three international organisations: Eurostat, ECMT and UNECE.

All main transport variables, compiled in a harmonised way, are presented in one publication, in order to allow comparisons between historical series. For each variable, the publication shows historical series for every ECMT member country. Data cover topics such as investment, infrastructure, rolling stock, human resources, traffic and energy consumption for different inland transport modes.

Main Developments for 2007

General aspects:

Due to co-ordination problems between the three international organisations (Eurostat, ECMT, UNECE) this publication has been put on hold. The new WEB data collection developed by Eurostat should improve the whole process and allow for a new publication in 2007, which will include the road accident statistics.

Transport Statistics

Investment in Transport Infrastructure

Purpose

To provide an annual update of statistical information in transport infrastructure investment, for all ECMT countries, on total gross investment and maintenance expenditure. To avoid duplication of work, the questionnaire has been developed with the European Commission and the European Investment Bank, to also match their needs.

Objectives and outputs

After processing the data, quality checks were carried out to select reliable time series as the base reference to produce the report "Trends in Transport Infrastructure Investment, 1985-2000".

For the next data collection (1992-2005) the questionnaire has been simplified, and each country will be informed of the different problems encountered with its data.

The questionnaire will be simplified and sent out with an analytical report.

Quarterly Transport Statistics

Purpose

To provide harmonised information on selected basic quarterly indicators in order to compare the latest inland transport trends between countries.

Objectives and outputs

To publish results every three months on the ECMT web site, on a country by country basis with six month lags maximum (data for the first quarter is published in September). Available series cover good transport in T-km, passenger transport in P-Km, road traffic in V-Km, brand new vehicles registration, car fuel consumption, road fatalities, imports and exports at current prices and industrial production.

Country by country data tables are available for the last five years, as well as graphs showing trends for both individual countries and selected groups of countries.

General aspects:

Starting with the publication of the 4 quarters of 2006, an analytical report will be published once a year.

Road Accidents

Purpose

To provide information on road safety data and safety measures recently adopted not only in ECMT countries, but also in ECMT Associated and Observer member countries.

Objectives and outputs

To publish annually statistical trends in road accidents. Data cover various indicators such as motor vehicles population, accident causing casualties, and number of killed and casualties. It also highlights a number of factors to be taken into account in any analysis of road accidents and provides a dynamic assessment of the reality of road safety.

Taxes and Charges for Road Freight Transport

Purpose

To provide indicators for efficiency and impact on competition of taxes and charges for transport in order to allow international comparisons.

Objectives and outputs

The final report provides a framework for international comparisons and discusses the economic principles for efficient systems of taxation. It provides a basis for addressing the questions "what is the right level for transport taxes" and "what kinds of charges should be used".

Transport Sector Trends Analysis

Purpose

To provide a first analysis of both passenger and freight transport trends, as well as road accident trends. A short list of selected indicators are collected for that purpose.

Objectives and outputs

To publish an analysis of the transport situation in European western and eastern countries as well as in the Baltic States and the CIS. In 2007 a new chapter has been added on OECD non-European countries. The publication also gives the latest statistics on the situation of the transport market in those countries and presents charts which help to show what changes have occurred since 1970.

Because it is published earlier than any other comparable study, this report provides first-hand figures about passenger and freight transport as well as road accidents.
