SETTING A FRAMEWORK FOR POLICY COHERENCE FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT <i>Introduction and Moderator: Ebba Dohlman, OECD</i> <i>Remarks by:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ernesto Soria Morales, OECD • Carina Lindberg, OECD • Mathilde Bouye, World Resources Institute <p>The recently adopted 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development as well as the Addis Ababa Action Agenda and the potential of a new climate agreement at the COP21 call for countries to mobilise the whole government and set national strategies to shift to more sustainable paths based on policy coherence, inter-institutional and multi-stakeholder collaboration, and more integrated approaches. Specifically, the 2030 Agenda as well as the Addis Ababa Action Agenda call upon all countries to “pursue policy coherence and an enabling environment for sustainable development at all levels and by all actors”. SDG 17 – on the means of implementation – includes a cross-cutting target (SDG 17.14) to “enhance policy coherence for sustainable development”. This discussion will help to frame our discussion on internalising the SDGs as well as the thematic discussions on food security and illicit financial flows in the afternoon. It will also:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Recall the key elements of the PCSD Framework developed by the OECD; • Introduce briefly the revisions in the generic module as a tool for applying a PCSD lens to implementing the SDGs; and • Explore options for monitoring progress on the implementation of target 17:14 on PCSD.

INTERNALISING THE SDGs INTO NATIONAL POLICY FRAMEWORKS AND INSTITUTIONS <i>Introduction and Moderator: Ulrika Grandin, Sweden</i></p> <p><i>Following introductory remarks by the moderator, participants will be invited to discuss the questions below in small groups of 3-4 people, before reporting back to plenary. Coffee will be made available in the meeting room.</i></p> <p>The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development emphasises that each government will decide how the SDGs and targets should be incorporated in national planning processes, policies and strategies. This session, organised as a <i>Tour de Table</i>, will provide Focal Points with an opportunity to share experiences and challenges with getting started on the mainstreaming of SDGs into national planning, policy-making processes, and monitoring and review mechanisms. It will also explore ways in which to best communicate the new agenda to stakeholders and engage them in pursuing policy coherence for sustainable development. Issues for consideration include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What are countries doing to get ready for implementing the SDGs? • What are the key challenges in moving from PCD to PCSD in light of the new 2030 Agenda? • What is the role of National Focal Points for PCD in this new agenda? • What kind of guidance or instruments at OECD could best support national efforts in making the transition?

APPLYING A PCSD LENS TO FOOD SECURITY IN THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS <i>Introduction and Moderator: Esko Mannisto, Finland</i> <i>Presentation by Cristina Mendes, OECD</i> <i>Discussant: Coralie David, OECD</i></p> <p>Achieving food security in the context of the new agenda will require identifying cross-sectoral interactions to better understand their implications and support more coherent decisions. This is critical to avoid contradictions, promote synergies and manage trade-offs, such as when food production and energy production compete for water resources. This session will introduce the revised module on food security in the context of the SDGs and seek feedback on its usefulness for members. Focal Points will be invited to express their interest in piloting the food security module and discuss the more practical aspects (organisation, timeline etc.) of such an exercise.
