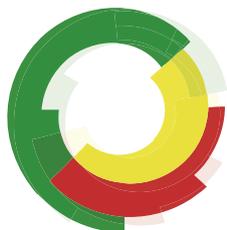

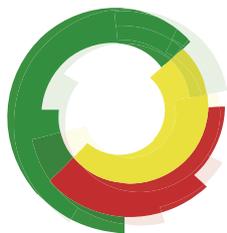

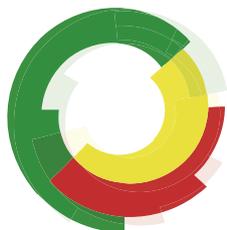
- » *How can ex post evaluation be better integrated into the policy-making process to create effective feedback loops and improve the regulatory frameworks?*

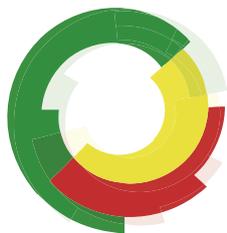
Questions for discussion:

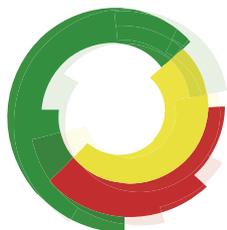

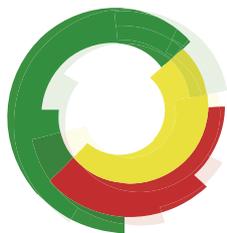

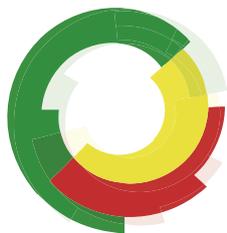
