
### About Norden iLibrary

Nordic publications play a key role as the outcome of the many projects and activities fostered and financed by the Nordic co-operation. Being primarily research-based analyses the publications form the basis for political decisions in the Nordic co-operation.

Every year around 100 new Nordic titles are published, approximately 65% of which are in English. They cover all the subjects that are part of the Nordic co-operation, with particular focus on:

- climate and environmental studies
- green growth and bioeconomy
- sustainable development
- health and social welfare
- education and research
- labour and employment
- the Arctic





These publications are now available online in the single research repository, Norden iLibrary www.norden-ilibrary.org. Titles are organised by series, year and alphabetically, and search and discovery of complete publications or even their components – articles and chapters – is a click away. The content is accessible in different formats – PDF, ePub and READ – to meet users' needs, whether for reading on a mobile device, sharing with peers via social networks or integrating content in a report.

#### New Policies to Promote Youth Inclusion: Accommodation of diversity in the Nordic Welfare States

This book examines changes over time among young adults who have experienced particular difficulties in achieving and retaining paid work in the ordinary labour market: youth with family background from non-Nordic countries and youth with disabilities in the Nordic countries. The book identifies processes and mechanisms enabling or preventing the labour market prospects of these two youth groups, and focuses on policy measures aiming at tackling demand-side barriers to their employment.

# A Nordic textile strategy: Part II: A proposal for increased collection, sorting, reuse and recycling of textiles

The proposed strategy for increased reuse and recycling of textiles provides a starting point for the work towards a more sustainable textile and fashion sector in the Nordic region. It is focused on the increased collection, sorting, reuse and recycling in the region and thereby provides one part of the sustainability puzzle in the sector. The proposed strategy includes incentives, policies and measures needed at local, regional, national and Nordic levels to ensure successful implementation.

# Future Opportunities for Bioeconomy: Focus on the West Nordic Region

This book provides an overview of bioresources in the West Nordic region focusing on Iceland, the Faroe Islands and Greenland, their utilisation and future opportunities based on green growth. The book provides a good basis for strategic identification of beneficial projects in the region.

# Food Redistribution in the Nordic Region: Experiences and results from a pilot study

This book has a focus on waste prevention through redistribution of food to low-income people via charity organisations. Food redistribution can go via national food banks and via direct redistribution, often at a local level. Food banks in the Nordic region redistributed about 1.5 million meals in 2013, and local charity organisations probably 2-3 times more. The demand and potential for redistribution is probably much higher than at present, and the book points out strategies and measures how food banks can contribute to future development.

#### **Arctic Social Indicators**

Arctic Social Indicators II (ASI-II) is a follow-up activity to ASI-I (2010) and the first Arctic Human Development Report (AHDR, 2004). The objective of ASI (2010) was to develop a small set of Arctic-specific social indicators that collectively would facilitate the tracking and monitoring of change in human development in the Arctic. ASI indicators were developed for six domains that Arctic residents considered prominent aspects of human development: Health and Population; Material Wellbeing; Education; Cultural Wellbeing; Contact with Nature; and Fate Control.
