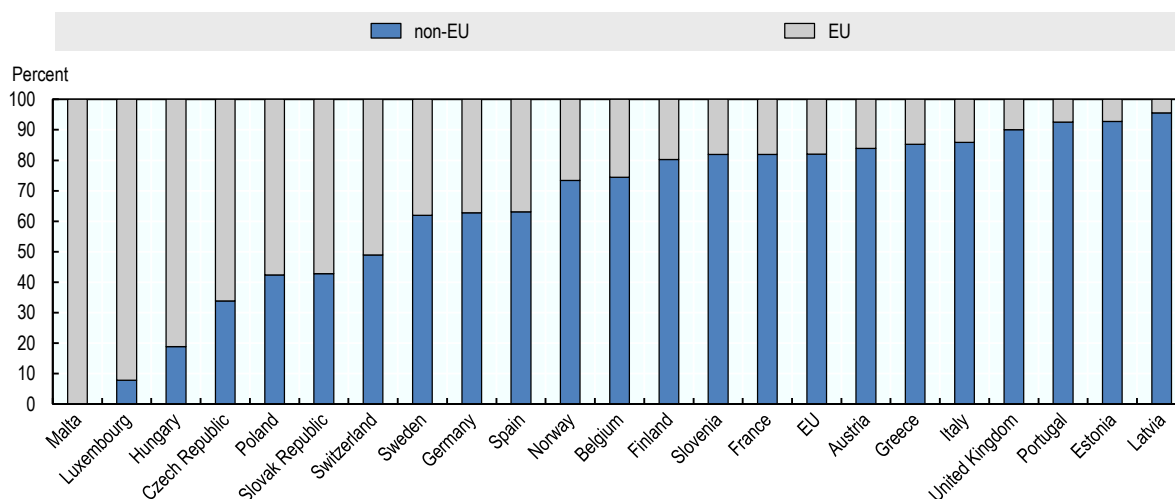

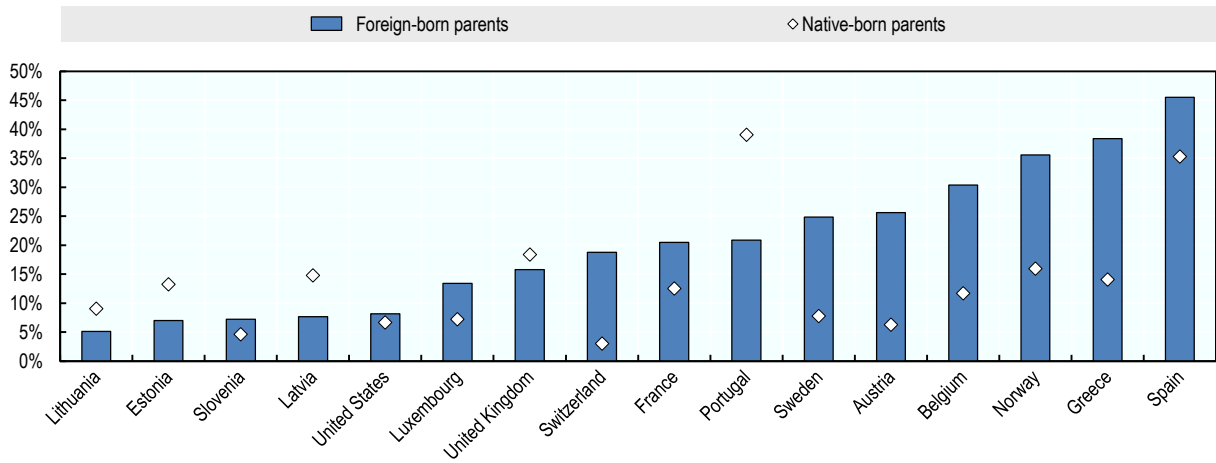
Figures 1.2, 1.3 and 1.4 have been corrected.

Figure 1.2. Native-born youth with immigrant parents, by parental origin, 15-34, European OECD countries, 2014



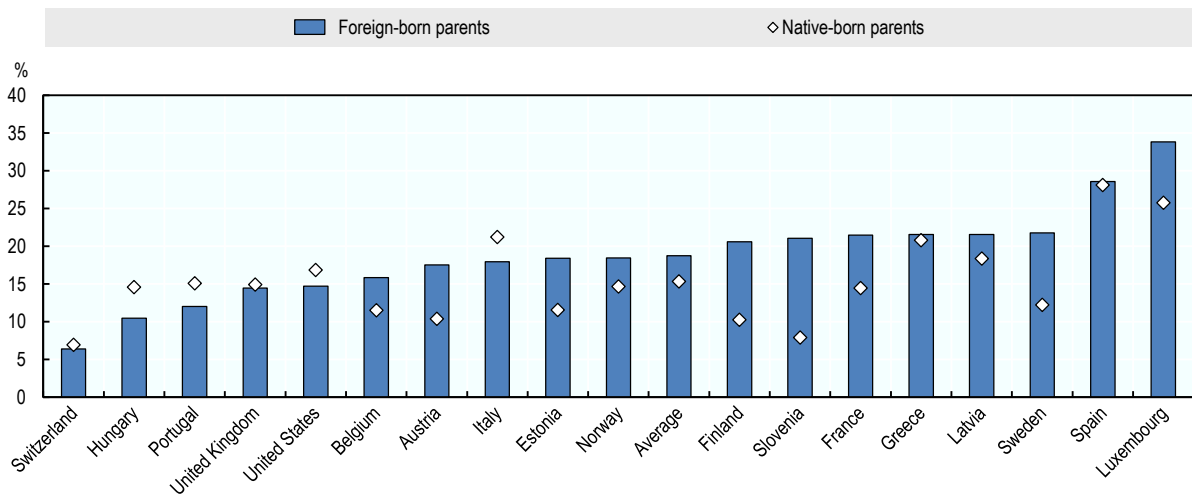
