

The Anti-Corruption Leaders Hub

Corruption undermines democratic values and economic growth and has a significant cost to business. Yet, government and the private sector cannot solve the corruption challenge alone: the supply and demand side of corruption require deeper cooperation and commitment at the highest organisational level to improve information sharing, build trust and have a significant impact on systemic corruption.

As public-private cooperation becomes critical to address corruption, [the OECD](#) is launching the 'Anti-Corruption Leaders Hub', a c-suite multi-stakeholder community to support the *Global Program to Galvanize the Private Sector as Partners to Combat Corruption (GPS)*¹, developed in coordination with [the Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs](#). The 'Leaders Hub' will work collectively to prevent and detect corruption, reinforce international efforts to curb bribery, promote business integrity and responsible influence, and contribute to a level playing field

The OECD and the US Department of State are therefore inviting private sector actors to join the Hub, commit to activities and drive meaningful change in areas of influence, as part of the US' broader year of action for [the 2023 Summit for Democracies](#). Specifically, the Leaders Hub will provide a platform for business executives to convene, discuss, tackle, commit and address emerging and systemic corruption issues alongside government leaders, law enforcement agencies and civil society. More broadly, it will guide and champion a global collective action that commits organisations across regions and sectors to actively address corruption.

Drive a whole-of-society approach

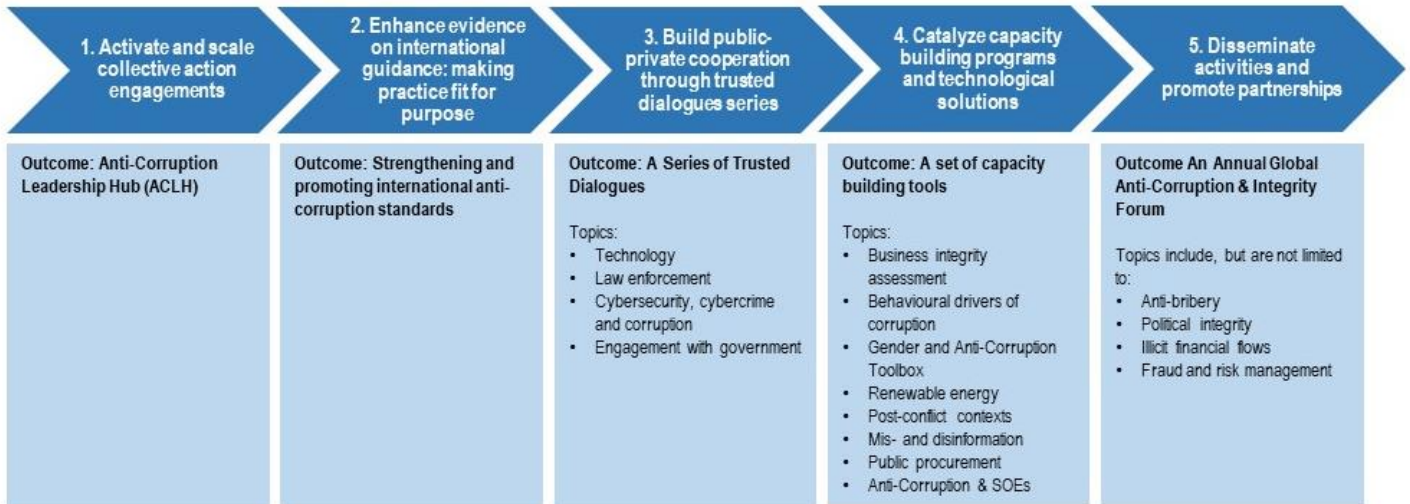
In this context, members of the Anti-Corruption Leaders Hub will represent their organisation at the highest level and meet once a year (in-person or virtually) at the side-lines of [OECD Global Anti-Corruption & Integrity Forum](#), at the headquarters in Paris. Particularly, members will be asked to;

- help shape international, regional and sectorial anti-corruption agendas;
- promote anti-corruption efforts through the exchange of strategic insights and the implementation of multi-stakeholder actions;
- demonstrate thought leadership and commitment to ethical behaviour;
- frame innovative solutions to address engrained and emerging corruption challenges with a determination to follow through from intent to action.

In order to galvanise the private sector and encourage global impact, members of the Leaders Hub are also invited to nominate relevant experts and practitioners to engage in the Program's activities. These practitioners will collaborate alongside OECD experts from the [Center for Responsible Business Conduct](#), the [Anti-Corruption Division](#) and the [Directorate for Public Governance](#) to co-design innovative solutions and drive impact through the active implementation of the various activities in their organisations, and areas of influence. Commitment, may resemble sharing of information, best practices, providing guidance to OECD experts; partnering on specific issues to design and implement innovative solutions, engage in collective actions, and/or provide in-kind resources.

¹ The Global Program to Galvanize the Private Sector as Partners to Combat Corruption supported by the US government, builds on OECD's multidisciplinary approach towards anti-corruption and integrity highlighting the role of collective action, capacity building, thought leadership, law enforcement and enhanced public-private cooperation.
