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Adams, Nigel

Minister of State for Asia at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the Department for International Development, United Kingdom

Nigel Adams was appointed Minister of State at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the Department for International Development on 13 February 2020. He was first elected the Conservative MP for Selby and Ainsty in May 2010.

Mr. Adams was previously Minister of State at the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport from 25 July 2019 to 13 February 2020. He was Parliamentary Under Secretary of State

at the Wales Office and Assistant Government Whip from November 2018 to April 2019.

He was a Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government.

He was also Government Whip (Lord Commissioner of HM Treasury), from January 2018 to November 2018.

He was an Assistant Government Whip from 15 June 2017 to 8 January 2018.



Bonucci, Nicola

Faciliator, Partnership of international organisations for effective international rule-making (IO Partnership)

Nicola Bonucci is Managing Director, Investigations & Compliance, at *Paul Hastings*, based in the Paris office, since 1 December 2019.

Prior to joining Paul Hastings, Mr. Bonucci served as the Legal Director of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). He joined the OECD in 1993 as a Legal Counselor, served as Deputy Director from 2000 until becoming Director in 2005. He focused

on general public international law issues, participating in the negotiation of international agreements, interpreting the basic texts of the Organisation, and providing legal opinions to the senior management (The Secretary-General and his Deputies), the Council (the governing body of the OECD), and its subsidiary bodies.

He played an active role in the drafting and the negotiation of the OECD legal instruments, and also dealt with personnel matters, including litigation in front of the Administrative Tribunal of the OECD, budgetary issues and contracts. Prior to joining the OECD, Mr Bonucci served as a Legal Officer with the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations.

Mr Bonucci holds a DEA in Public International Law from the University of Paris X Nanterre, a DESS in International Administration from the University of Paris II-Assas, and a Master of International and Comparative Law from the University of Notre Dame.



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Eloit, Monique

Director General of the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE)

Dr Monique Eloit was elected Director General of the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) on 26 May 2015 by the World Assembly. She began her five-year term of office on 1 January 2016, as the 7th Director General of the OIE, after having served as Deputy Director General of the OIE for six years.

Prior to joining the OIE, she occupied at the French Ministry of Agriculture successively the positions of Assistant to the Deputy Director for animal health and protection, in which capacity she participated in setting up the national agency for veterinary products (ANMV), and Deputy Head of the Department for food quality and veterinary and plant health actions. For over six years she also acted as Chairperson of the Standing Committee of the European Convention for the protection of animals kept for farming purposes (T-AP), at the Council of Europe. In 2000, Dr Eloit was appointed Director at the French Food Safety Agency (Afssa), where she helped to reform the expert committees, supervised national veterinary laboratories with regard to their scientific and technical support activities, and represented Afssa on the European Food Safety Authority (EFSA) Committee of national agencies. In 2005, she returned to the Ministry of Agriculture, holding three appointments simultaneously, as Deputy Director General for Food, Chief Veterinary officer (CVO) of France and Delegate to the OIE. Her duties as CVO and Delegate to the OIE involved working at a national level, regional and international levels. In 2009, she joined the OIE as Deputy Director General where she played a leading role in institutional relations with Member Countries and with international organisations having an agreement with the OIE. She took over as Director General on 1 January 2016, becoming the 7th Director General of the OIE and the first woman to hold the position.



Gurría, Angel

Secretary-General of the Organisation of Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD)

Mr. Angel Gurría has been the Secretary-General of the OECD since 2006. Under his leadership, the Organisation has established itself as a pillar of the global economic governance architecture including its active engagement with the G20, G7, APEC and other international fora. Mr. Gurría has advanced the OECD's impact and relevance in several policy area, focusing on the promotion of better lives through inclusive growth and new approaches to economic challenges. He has also made the OECD more inclusive through new memberships, strengthening the link with key emerging economies and fostering its global outreach. Mr. Gurría came to the OECD following a distinguished career in public service in his native Mexico, including positions as Minister of Foreign Affairs and Minister of Finance and Public Credit in the 1990s.

Mr. Gurría holds a B.A. degree in Economics from UNAM (Mexico) and a M.A. degree in Economics from Leeds University (United Kingdom). He has received Honorary Degrees from the Universidad de Valle de México, Rey Juan Carlos University, European University of Madrid, and the Universities of Leeds, Haifa and Bratislava.



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Hayes, Anne

Chairperson, Pharmaceutical Inspection Co-operation Scheme (PIC/S)

Ms. Hayes has been working with the Health Products Regulatory Authority for 22 years. In the role of Inspection Manager she has responsibility for inspection programmes relating to Good Manufacturing Practice, medical device auditing, Good Clinical Practice, Good Pharmacovigilance Practice and Good Practice in relation to blood, tissues and cells and organs for transplantation. She is the Chair of the Pharmaceutical Inspection Co-operation Scheme. Before joining the HPRA she worked in the pharmaceutical industry for 5 years as

a QC Supervisor and as a qualified person (QP).



Kauffmann, Céline

Deputy Head, Regulatory Policy Division, Public Governance Directorate, Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD)

Ms. Kauffmann joined the OECD in 2000. She is the Deputy Head of the Regulatory Policy Division, where she leads the work on international regulatory cooperation and on the OECD Regulatory Policy Outlook. Previously, she worked with the Investment Division of the OECD Directorate for Financial and Enterprises Affairs, where she was responsible for the work on private sector participation in infrastructure and on private investment and green growth. Prior to that, she was responsible for coordinating the OECD work on the annual African Development Bank / OECD African Economic Outlook Report. Before joining the OECD, Ms. Kauffmann contributed to the *2000 Transition Report* of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development and worked at the London School of Economics as a research assistant. Ms. Kauffmann holds a PhD in Economics from the Université Paris I, Panthéon-Sorbonne.



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Kituyi, Mukhisa

Secretary-General, United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD)

Mukhisa Kituyi became UNCTAD's seventh Secretary-General on 1 September 2013. After serving an initial four-year term, he was reappointed by the General Assembly in July 2017 for an additional term that began on 1 September that year.

Dr. Kituyi served as a researcher at Norway's Christian Michelsen Institute from 1989 to 1991, and as Programme Director of the African Centre for Technology Studies in Nairobi

from 1991 to 1992. He was elected to the Kenyan Parliament in 1992, and was twice re-elected.

He was Kenya's Minister of Trade and Industry from 2002 to 2007. During this period, Dr. Kituyi chaired for two years the Council of Ministers of the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) and the African Trade Ministers' Council. He also served as chairman of the Council of Ministers of the African, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) Group of States, and was lead negotiator for Eastern and Southern African ministers during the European Union-ACP Economic Partnership Agreement negotiations. He was convenor of the agriculture negotiations carried out at the World Trade Organization's Sixth Ministerial Conference held in Hong Kong, China in 2005. From 2008 to 2012, Dr. Kituyi was a member of a team of experts advising the presidents of the nations of the East African Community on how to establish more effective regional economic links. From 2011 to 2012, he was a consultant for the African Union Commission, where he helped to develop the structure for a pan-African free trade area. Immediately prior to becoming Secretary-General, Dr. Kituyi was Chief Executive of the Kenya Institute of Governance, based in Nairobi. During 2012, Dr. Kituyi also served as a non-resident fellow of the Africa Growth Initiative of the Brookings Institution, Washington, D.C. He was a resident scholar there in 2011.



Lim, Kitack

Secretary-General, International Maritime Organization (IMO)

Mr. Lim was born in Masan, Gyeongsangnam-do, in the Republic of Korea. He majored in nautical science at the Korea Maritime and Ocean University (KMOU), Busan, graduating in 1977. He worked on ships as a Korean naval officer and for an international shipping company. He joined the Korea Maritime and Port Administration in 1985, while continuing with further studies at the Graduate School of Administration, Yonsei University, obtaining a Master's

Degree in 1990. He then studied maritime administration at the World Maritime University (WMU), graduating with a master's degree. From 1995 he attended a doctoral programme for international law at KMOU, completing course work in 1998. Mr. Lim began attending IMO meetings as part of the Republic of Korea's delegation in 1986 and he engaged in activities to promote maritime safety through effective implementation of IMO conventions in his country and other IMO Member States in the Asian region. He was elected Chair of IMO's Sub-Committee on Flag State Implementation (FSI - now III) in 2001 and of the Tokyo Memorandum on Port State Control in 2004. In 2006, Mr. Lim was appointed Director General of the Maritime Safety Bureau of the Ministry of Land, Transport and Maritime Affairs (MLTM) and then as a Senior Maritime Attaché at the Embassy of the Republic of Korea in London and led all IMO work for the Republic of Korea, serving as an Alternate Permanent Representative to IMO up to August 2009. Following that, he was re-appointed Director General for Maritime Safety Bureau (MLTM). In March 2011, Mr. Lim was appointed Commissioner of the Korean Maritime Safety Tribunal (KMST). In July 2012, he assumed the position of President of Busan Port Authority, until January 2016 when he took up his appointment as Secretary-General of IMO.



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Mikuriya, Kunio

Secretary General of the World Customs Organization (WCO)

Mr. Kunio Mikuriya has been Secretary General of the World Customs Organization (WCO) since 1 January 2009. He provides leadership and executive management for the global Customs community's priorities, including developing global Customs instruments, standards, and tools; securing and facilitating global trade; realizing revenues; building Customs-business partnerships; and delivering capacity building in support of Customs reform and modernization.

Prior to joining the WCO, he worked for Japan's Ministry of Finance for 25 years. During his career with the Ministry, Mr. Mikuriya occupied a variety of senior posts, which have given him broad experience and knowledge in Customs, trade, development, budget, and financial policies. He served as Director of Enforcement where he led efforts to fight illicit trade, then as Director of Research and International Affairs paving the way for the conclusion of the first regional trade agreement for Japan, and then as a Counsellor in the Tariff and Customs Bureau. He also served as Director of Salaries and Allowances to coordinate remuneration levels for the entire government workforce, and as the Budget Controller for Foreign Affairs, Official Aid, International Trade and Industry, in the Budget Bureau. In addition, he spent time as a Counsellor at the Japanese Mission to the WTO in Geneva and participated in the GATT Uruguay Round trade negotiations.

Mr. Mikuriya has a degree in law from the University of Tokyo and a PhD in international relations from the University of Kent.



Milton, Martin

Director, International Bureau of Weights and Measures (BIPM)

Dr Martin Milton joined the International Bureau of Weights and Measures (BIPM) in October 2012 as Director Designate and became Director on 1 January 2013.

The BIPM is the international organization through which Member States act together on matters related to measurement science and measurement standards. It was founded when the Metre Convention was signed in Paris in 1875. It has now grown to have 62 Member States and 40 Associate States and Economies.

During his term as Director of the BIPM, the organization has led the adoption worldwide of a new technical basis for the "SI units" that provides greater access and greater opportunities to exploit future advanced technologies. It has also launched a programme aimed at capacity-building amongst Member States and has reviewed its Mutual Recognition Arrangements (MRA) that provides a transparent basis for recognizing measurement capabilities between more than a hundred countries.

As Director of the BIPM, Dr Milton manages a staff of 72 from 13 nationalities.

Before he moved to the BIPM in 2012, Dr Milton worked at the National Physical Laboratory (NPL), United Kingdom. He has a BA from Oxford University a PhD from Southampton University and an MBA from the London Business School.



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Mujica, Sergio

Secretary-General, International Organization for Standardization (ISO)

Sergio Mujica joined ISO as Secretary-General in July 2017, having spent 7 years at the World Custom's Organization (WCO) as Deputy Secretary-General. The WCO aims to enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of Custom's administrations worldwide, and within this role Mr Mujica was responsible for the design and implementation of the WCO's strategic plan. This included simplification, harmonization and standardization of custom's procedures in addition

to capacity building initiatives aimed at the WCO members. This gave him significant experience in an international setting, building consensus within a large membership-based organization.

Prior to working at the World Customs Organization, Mr Mujica spent 15 years working for the Government of Chile with the Ministry of Agriculture, the Ministry of Economic Affairs and as the Director General of Chile Customs. A Chilean national, he has a law degree from the Pontificia Universidad Catolica de Chile and a Master's degree in International Law from the American University in Washington DC.



Naundorf, Stephan

Chair OECD Regulatory Policy Committee (RPC)

Stephan Naundorf manages the co-operation of the Better Regulation Unit with the regional governments, the parliamentary groups of the German parliament and the main umbrella organisations of the German Economy. His scope of work includes coordinating the cooperation of the German government on better regulation, issues with international partners organizations. He is also responsible for the further development of the Federal

Government's programme for better regulation and holds a position as advisor to the Minister of State to the Chancellor. In this capacity, he reports to the Minister of State in charge of Federal-State Coordination of the German government and better regulation. Stephan holds an MBA and a Master's Degree in Political Sciences. Before joining the Federal Chancellery in 2006, he was a member of the Ministry of Defense for five years and worked in the economic sector for ten years. He was also member of the management board and shareholder of an advertising and public relations agency.



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Paulinich Velarde, Javier (Amb.)

Permanent Secretary, Latin American and Caribbean Economic System (SELA)

Ambassador Javier Paulinich Velarde is a Peruvian Sociologist and Diplomat with a 35-year long career. He has represented Peru in numerous countries, as well as in the United Nations (New York, Geneva, and Vienna). As part of his diplomatic experience, he held the positions of Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Peru to Austria and India and Director-General for Economic Affairs of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of his country.

He was elected, by acclamation, as Permanent Secretary of the Latin American and Caribbean Economic System (SELA) for the period 2017-2021. During his term, he has shown particular interest in promoting the strengthening of micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs), making emphasis on the Public Policy Index for MSMEs in Latin America and the Caribbean (IPPALC) developed jointly with the OECD and CAF-development bank of Latin America. He has also renewed important cooperation agreements with several institutions, such as: ECLAC, ALADI, CAF, CAN, CISS, CLAD, FLACSO, MERCOSUR, OECD, SEGIB and the EURASIAN Economic Commission, among others.

Before taking office at SELA, he was Professor of International Economic Policy and International Economic Systems at the Diplomatic Academy of Peru.



Redondo, Melvin E.

Secretary-General, Secretariat for Central American Economic Integration (SIECA)

Ambassador Melvin Enrique Redondo, from Honduras, holds the position of Secretary General of the Secretariat for Central American Economic Integration (SIECA) since July 16, 2017. Previously, he served as Undersecretary of State for Economic Integration and Foreign Trade of Honduras (2011 -2017) and as Head of Trade Negotiations in free trade agreements with the United States, Canada, Mexico, Peru, Colombia, Taiwan, Korea, and the Association Agreement between Central America and the European Union.

In the Ministry of Industry and Commerce of Honduras, he served as Counselor of the Mission of Honduras to the World Trade Organization (WTO) in 2002, Director General of Economic Integration and Trade Policy between 2003 and 2005, and as Undersecretary of State for Economic Integration and Foreign Trade in the 2005. Additionally, he was part of the team that negotiated the accession of Honduras to the GATT / WTO in 1992-1994; and represented Honduras in the WTO in the presentation of the 2nd. and 3rd. Honduras Trade Policy Review and the Ministerial Conferences held in said forum. Regarding Central American economic integration, his participation in the discussions of the Framework Agreement for the Establishment of the Customs Union of Central America stands out; the Incorporation of Panama to the Central American Economic Integration Subsystem; and the Central American Strategy for Trade Facilitation and Coordinated Border Management. In his capacity as Undersecretary of State for Economic Integration and Foreign Trade, he designed and led the work for the establishment of the Guatemala-Honduras Customs Union within the framework of the Deep Integration Process towards the Free Transit of People and Goods between said countries.
