What do we talk about when we talk about love?



Our ambition

- Increased understanding of terms related to toolbox of international instruments developed by IOs
- Not try to “harmonize” or impose a common terminology
- Delineate a broad typology of international instruments



Two key issues for discussion

- What do we do:
 - Collecting examples of instruments (binding/non binding)
 - Comparing definitions
 - Understand our differences (i.e. role of non-members and of different stakeholders)
- How do we do it:
 - Do we develop i.e. a convention in the same way as a i.e. a standard?
 - Which tools are better adapted to which needs? Why (timing, inclusiveness, etc) ?
 - How was the development process of the different tools agreed to?
 - How is coherence between the different tools upheld?



Work plan

- Finalization of the questionnaire
- Collect different definitions of international instruments – inputs from Member States and Academics are welcome
- Compilation and discussion of the replies and findings of the questionnaire

The survey seeks to collect information on delineating a broad typology of international instruments used by International Organisations with the following objectives:


- Catalogue and define the various types of instruments









Working typology of implementation mechanisms
