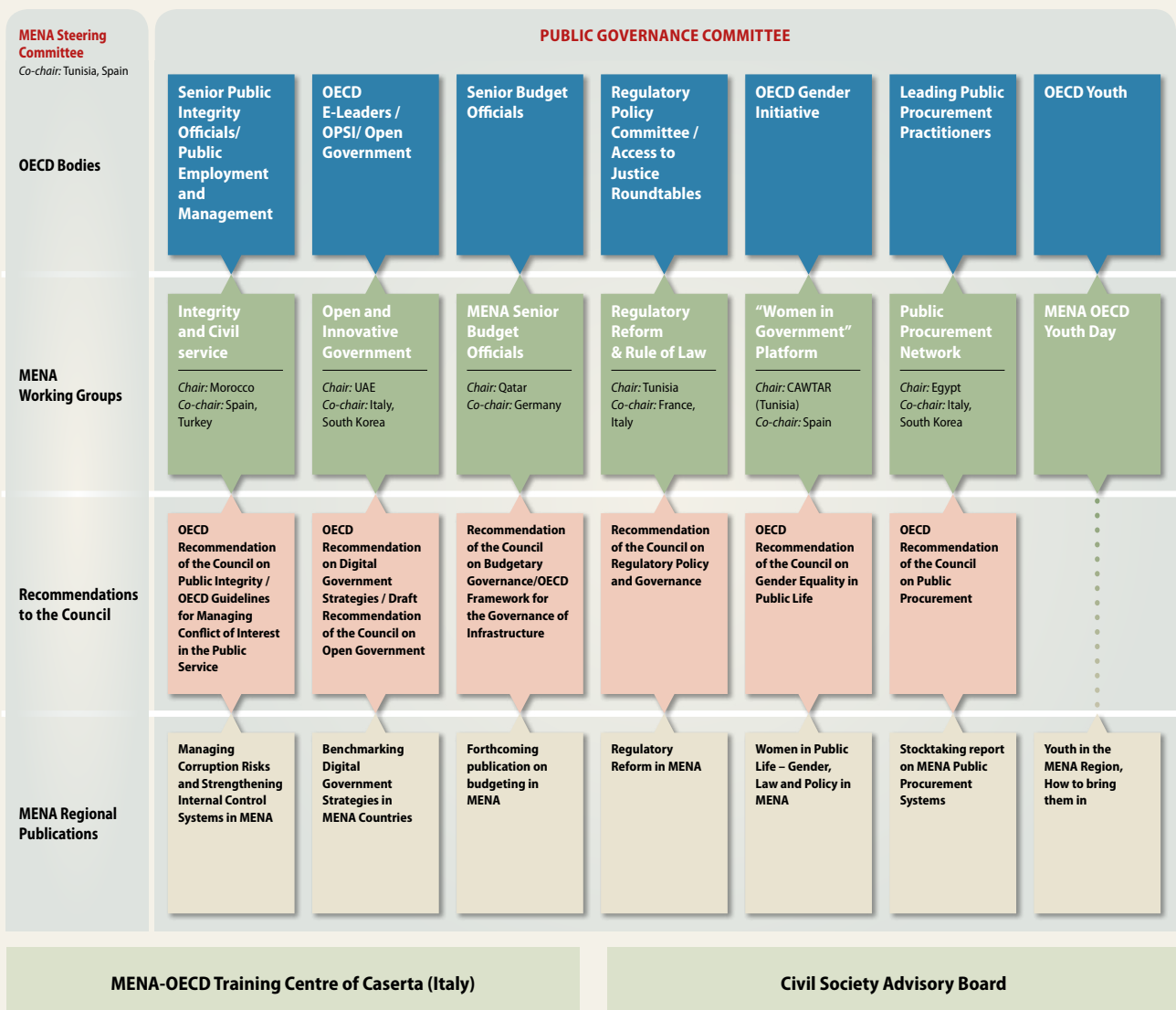

MENA-OECD Governance Programme’s Training Centre of Caserta

The Training Centre of Caserta is a joint effort of the MENAOECD Governance Programme and the Italian National School of Public Administration. The Training Centre provides capacity building activities to enhance good governance reforms

- In 2017 three Regional Workshops took place in Caserta on transparent and participatory institutional communication and on access to information in the MENA region.
- In 2018, the Caserta Centre will organise every other months a regional training course, including a Study visit on Women’s participation in parliaments and policy-making in Morocco, Jordan and Egypt.
