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How stronger rural-urban collaboration can help recovery and build resiliency?

14:35-15:05	Session 1	<p>Russia's large-scale aggression against Ukraine sent new shock waves around the world as OECD countries advance in the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. These shocks are having a profound impact on OECD rural and urban regions at a time when they face structural transformations, disrupted energy, and food markets. Effective recovery and resilience strategies should include a push for more rural-urban partnerships paving the way for them to work together to overcome these challenges. Stronger rural-urban cooperation would result in more sustainable land use and planning, better services (public transport, health, education, etc). 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Moving beyond community flows: expanding the way to measure rural-urban interdependency

15:05-15:25	Session 2	<p>The interdependency of rural and urban areas is reflected in the rural-to-urban services (e.g., food, water, raw materials, renewable energy) and the urban-to-rural services (e.g., markets for agricultural products, farm inputs, consumer goods). Interdependence means that changes in one place affect the other. Specifically, the decisions and policy actions taken in one region could often have implications for those in the other – whether explicitly or implicitly. To date, the most common measures of rural-urban interdependence is based on commuting flows. However, one must go beyond commuting flows to include other factors e.g., environmental and social and also consider the weight of that interdependence e.g. level of dependence on that interaction. 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Strengthening rural-urban partnerships—overcoming barriers to rural-urban co-operation

15:25-16:15	Session 3	<p>Rural-urban partnerships are important tools for better co-ordinating rural-urban interactions. They can be used to better design and implement policy at the appropriate scale, providing a flexible and inclusive approach. However rural-urban partnerships face some specific challenges that may hamper their formation. For example, co-operation can be difficult when there is a large difference in size, resources, capacity, regulatory and political obstacles, lack of trust and policy fragmentation.
